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# **Report of the Directors**

The Board has pleasure in presenting the Annual Report and Financial Statements for Children's Health Scotland for the year ended 31 March 2021.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice 2019 (FRS 102) - and in accordance with the special provisions of Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small companies.

# **Core Objectives**

Children's Health Scotland works to improve standards of child healthcare by raising awareness of the needs, rights and concerns of children, young people, their parents and carers on a range of committees and working groups within the NHS, statutory and voluntary sector. We also contribute as a member of various Scottish Government Cross-Party Groups for children and young people's health.

The Core Objectives of Children's Health Scotland are to promote the health of children and young people and for that purpose:

- a. to bring to the notice of parents and carers, health and other professionals, and the public in general, the special health needs of children and young people in hospital and other settings.
- b. to enable children and young people to understand, and exercise, their healthcare rights and to meet their individual healthcare needs.
- c. to seek to ensure that all children and young people admitted to hospitals are cared for in wards specially designed for them.
- d. to seek to ensure that all hospital wards admitting children and young people are designed to accommodate parents and carers with their sick child, including access to recreation facilities for patients and the children of visiting parents and carers, and a dedicated rest area for parents and carers, and that they are maintained as such.
- e. to seek to ensure that all hospital wards admitting children and young people provide access to education and to play for patients.
- f. to promote the treatment of children and young people at home wherever possible, or in a setting close to home, where this is in the best interest of the child or young person.
- g. to provide an information service for parents and carers and others interested in the health and wellbeing of children and young people in hospital and of children and young people with healthcare needs in other settings.

# A message from the Chair

As I write this, the UK is emerging from another lockdown at the end of a year which, by any measure, has posed a major challenge to the health and wellbeing of children and their families.

Through the work of our staff, we have seen clearly the impact that COVID-19 has had on the children and young people we support. Problems with mental health and wellbeing, digital exclusion, online safety, poverty, hunger, health rights - none of which are new to us but all of which have been accentuated as a direct result of the pandemic. Some of the changes we had helped to initiate pre-pandemic are now being reversed, which is really disheartening.

Given the unprecedented nature of the pandemic, it is hard to predict what lies ahead, but one thing about which I am sure, is that for children and young people to thrive, it is critically important that their voices are heard and their needs addressed.

Our Manifesto, launched in January prior to the Holyrood election and issued to all political parties, was informed by the needs of those we support. It called for improvements to be made to the provision of facilities and physical and mental health services for children and young people, and their families and carers, in ways that give realistic hope that real change will take place. We are committed to work with the Scottish Government to enable these changes to be realised.

There is so much to be done to repair the damage that COVID-19 has inflicted on the health and wellbeing of children and young people. While the crisis has continued, demand has grown, and fundraising has been under pressure. Our dedicated staff have worked tirelessly to ensure children, young people, and their families and carers have continued to receive support. Their work is reflected in this Annual Review and Impact Report and some key highlights of this work include:

- The launch of SMS:CONNECT a new online Self-Management Service for children and young people living with long-term health conditions.
- The delivery of a new Children's Health Challenge to share a greater understanding of healthcare rights for children and young people. The challenge has been accessed by over 50 schools and over 1,000 school children have taken part.
- The launch of Scottish Children's Health Week and Awards that showcased the tremendous amount of work and activities which focused on the health and wellbeing of children and young people in Scotland.
- The publication of our Minority Ethnic Health and Information Service (MEHIS) research which provided a picture of local support and information services for refugee and asylum-seeking families.
- The development of an open access Professional Learning Resource in Mental Health and Wellbeing for use by all staff working in schools across Scotland. The resource was commissioned by the Scottish Government and we have been working in partnership with Digital Bricks and the Mental Health Foundation.
- The distribution of over 400 My Health | Play and Information Packs to support vulnerable families in the community. The work was funded with grant aid from the Scottish Government and delivered in partnership with the Trussell Trust.
- The delivery of virtual health-related play sessions to primary school children and the delivery of virtual 1:1 sessions to support the health and wellbeing of children and young people.

Looking to the future, we will remain focused on supporting the health and wellbeing of children and young people and their families through our five key strategic priorities as outlined in our Children's Health Scotland Strategy 2020-23. The voices of children and young people must continue to be heard and specifically we will aim to achieve the following:

- 1. **Expertise and information:** We will work to ensure that children, young people and families have access to age-appropriate information to enable them to receive the best quality healthcare. EACH Charter Article 7, UNCRC Articles 23 and 24.
- 2. **Voice:** We will work both at national and local level with all those responsible for the formulation of healthcare policy to ensure the voices of children and young people with health conditions are heard. EACH Charter Articles 8 and 9, UNCRC Articles 28 and 29.
- 3. **Improving life experiences:** Our work will continue to enable children and young people to receive the best possible healthcare to improve their life experiences. EACH Charter Article 8 and 10, UNCRC Articles 23 and 24.
- 4. **Training and resources:** We will provide a range of training and resources to ensure that children, young people, and their families are empowered to identify the needs of children during illness and access appropriate services. EACH Charter Article 7, UNCRC Articles 28 and 29.
- 5. **Health-related play:** Play is a serious business when it comes to children's health. It is more than just a chance to have fun and is a fundamental right for children. We will continue to advocate for health-related play for all children in hospital, in the community and at home.

Today, I am more certain than ever of the importance of our mission and values, and proud of our achievements, many of which are reported here. I remain hugely grateful for the commitment of our staff and to the Executive Committee, who continue to serve, support, and scrutinise the charity's work.

Next year will be critical as we continue to do everything possible to ensure children and young people have the best health outcomes possible. I know this cannot be achieved without the continued hard work, knowledge and enthusiasm of our staff, the dedication of our supporters and volunteers, and the generosity of our funders. More than ever, this support is essential to ensure that our work continues so that every child and young person can exercise their right to best quality healthcare.

#### **Financial Review:**

In the year to 31 March 2021 the company had a gross income of £268,436 and expenditure of £270,137 (2020: £223,086 and £203,080 respectively).

Funds under management were £193,446 (2020: £195,147).

The main funding source for the year was from the Scottish Government Children, Young People and Families Early Intervention Fund towards Core activity and our Children and Young People in and Leaving Care workstream. These Funds were administered by CORRA. We are grateful for this funding and for all the other funders itemised elsewhere in this report, which has enabled the charity to work on behalf of all sick children and young people.

# **Reserves Policy**

It is the policy of the company to maintain unrestricted funds, which are the free reserves of the company, at an appropriate level. The Directors believe this to be between three and six months of operational expenditure. Based on the budgeted expenditure for the year ending 31 March 2022, the free reserves will fall within the target level

# **Risk Management**

The Directors have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to operations and finances, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks.

# Structure, Governance and Management

CHS is governed by Trustees who are Directors in terms of the Companies Act. The Directors of the company are also under the Company's Articles known as members of the Executive Committee. Under the requirements of the Articles of Association all Executive Committee members retire from office at the AGM but are eligible for re-election for up to a maximum period of nine years.

The work of the charity focuses on the healthcare needs and rights of children and young people and the Executive Committee ensures that the needs of this group are appropriately represented through the health service, educational and specialist play backgrounds of its members. The charity has also recruited Executive Committee members with traditional business skills. The trustees are asked for recommendations. Application forms are then sent to those interested and a shortlist created. The Chair interviews potential Trustees and then makes a recommendation to Executive Committee who subsequently agree the appointment. If no recommendations are forthcoming, vacancies are advertised through appropriate organisations such as SCVO. All committee members are familiar with the work of the charity and new members meet with representatives of the Executive Committee and staff in order to become familiar with the charity and its context.

#### Administrative details

Children's Health Scotland (CHS) is a company limited by guarantee (company number: SC100114). The Company was established under a Memorandum of Association which set out the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the Company being wound up the liability of each member is limited to £1. The Company is allowed to dispense with the word "limited" in its title. The Company is recognised as a charity (Scottish Charity No SC 006016). It has its registered office at 22 Laurie Street Edinburgh EH6 7AB.

# 1 Accounting Policies:

a) Basis of Accounting - The financial statements of the charity have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019), the financial reporting standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006.

The presentation currency is £ sterling.

The company meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the accounting policies.

The directors consider it appropriate to draw up the accounts on the going concern basis. In reaching this view we have considered the current and future funding position and the level of free reserves available to meet any short term shortfalls.

- b) Income All income is included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:
  - Donations and legacies are received by way of grants, donations, gifts and legacies and are
    included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where
    entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are
    recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant. Such income is
    only deferred when it has been specified that it can only be used in a future accounting
    period or there are donor-imposed conditions which must be met before the charity has
    unconditional entitlement.
  - Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.
  - Investment income is included when receivable.
  - Income from charitable trading activities is accounted for when earned.
  - Income from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, is accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.
- Expenditure Expenditure is included on an accruals basis. The company is not registered for VAT thus expenditure is shown gross of irrecoverable VAT.
  - Costs of raising funds comprise the costs associated with attracting donations and legacies.
  - Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its
    activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated
    directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.
    Governance costs of the charity are included within the support costs.
  - All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

- d) Equipment costing over £500 is capitalised. It is stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided on a straight-line basis of 20% on the cost less estimated residual value over its estimated useful life.
- e) Pensions: The Company provides for employees to pay money into a money purchase personal pension scheme. The pension charge in the income and expenditure account represents the amounts payable by the company to the fund during the year.
- f) Operating Leases Rental payable under operating leases are charged to the income and expenditure account over the lease term on a straight-line basis.
- g) Funds held by the charity are:

Unrestricted Funds: These are the funds that can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the directors.

Restricted Funds: Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or if they have been raised for a specific purpose.

# h) Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

# i) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

### j) Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

## k) Significant judgements and estimates

Preparing the financial statements may require the trustees to make significant judgements and estimates. There were no items in the financial statements where these judgements and estimates were required.

# 2 Legal Status

The charity is a Company Limited by Guarantee, registered in Scotland, and has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of winding up is limited to £1. The company number and registered office are disclosed in the directors' report.

# 3 Taxation

The company is accepted by H M Revenue and Customs as a charity. Accordingly, no provision has been made for any taxation liability on surpluses.

# **4 Support Costs**

Support costs, including governance costs, are allocated between raising funds and charitable activities on the basis of estimated time spent on each activity. This is detailed in note 6.

# 17 Restricted & Designated Funds

## Children's Health and Wellbeing Service | Greater Glasgow & Clyde

# Children's Health and Wellbeing Service | Tayside Child Health

CHS's work in Tayside continues thanks to funding from the Angus Voluntary Action Fund. We will be looking to raise further funding for this service during 2021-22.

## Core & Development Costs

The grant funding from the Scottish Government Children, Young People and Families Early Intervention Fund assisted with core costs, development work around the healthcare needs and rights of care experienced children and young people and development work to reach out to 'hard to reach' groups for the year. This was supplemented by funding from the Scottish Government Wellbeing Fund.

## Self-Management Service

This service delivers self-management programmes to children and young people with long-term health conditions to improve their life experiences. This money has been provided to help with the funding of the Chief Executive post within the organisation.

#### **Plavbox**

This relates to income received for sales of playboxes.

#### **Publications**

This represents money earmarked for the cost of producing or updating publications.

#### Capital Expenditure Fund
